Hurricane evacuation zones are no longer referenced by storm category, but are now named by hurricane surge evacuation zones: A, B, C, D and E.

Evacuations are ordered by zones for storm surge and wind, in a phased manner. This means you may see the evacuation of zone A before you see any effects of the tropical storm.

Be sure the shelter is open before you go. There are several shelters throughout Lee County. These are the closest. All listed shelters will not be open for every storm. Local radio and television stations will announce which shelters are open. We cannot predict how long you may have to remain at the shelter, since we cannot predict how damaging the effects of each storm will be. Food will be provided, but you should bring some food items with you for between meals, or in case you do not like what is being served. If you have diet restrictions or require specialty foods, you must bring those.

DISASTER SUPPLY KIT CHECKLIST 🗹

June is the start of Florida's hurricane season and now is the time to prepare.

Be sure to buy plenty of water, waterproof sealable plastic storage bags for important papers and household items.

Have as much nonperishable food as possible on hand including canned meats, vegetables and fruits. Don't forget pet foods.

Use old milk jugs to store water for cleaning up afterwards and for use in toilets. Be sure to know your evacuation zone and nearest shelters. Pack a knapsack, backpack or any light piece of luggage to hold at lease 4 days worth of necessities.

If you have family members who live in a sturdy home that can withstand the winds be sure to contact them and make arrangements.

Let trusted neighbors know if you are leaving in a disaster.

This is not our first hurricane season and it won't be our last.

If you have special needs, register with Lee County for assistance at:

General

- At least two weeks supply of medication, medical supplies used regularly and a list of allergies
- List of the style, serial number, and manufacturer information of required medical devices
- Flashlight Do not use candles and be sure to have enough batteries
- Radio Battery operated or hand cranked radio, a NOAA weather radio
- Banks and ATMs may not be available after a storm

Pet Care Items

- Pet food and water
- Proper identification
- Medical records/ microchip info
- A carrier or cage
- Muzzle and leash
- Water and food bowls

- Supplies for your service animal

Phone Numbers

Maintain a list of important phone numbers including: county emergency management office. evacuation sites, doctors, banks, schools, veterinarian, a number for out of town contact, friends & family

Find a safe place to shelter in a hurricane

There are two shelters near Buccaneer: The NORTH FORT MYERS RECREATON CENTER, 2000 Recreation Way. It is behind the North Fort Myers Library across the street from Buccaneer Estates.

The second nearby shelter is at the NORT H FORT MYERS ACADEMY OF THE ARTS, at 1856 Arts Way. It is north of Buccaneer off Laurel Lane going east and Garden Street to the north.

Category 1: Very dangerous winds will produce some damage. Well-constructed homes could have damage to roof, shingles, vinyl siding and gutters. Large branches of trees will snap and shallowly rooted trees may be toppled. Extensive damage to power lines and poles likely will result in power outages that could last a few to several days.

Category 2: Extremely dangerous winds will cause extensive damage. Well-constructed frame homes could sustain major roof and siding damage. Many shallowly rooted tress will be snapped or uprooted and block numerous roads. Near-total power loss is expected with outages that could last from several days to weeks.

Category 3: Devastating damage will occur. Well built frame homes may incur major damage or



removal of roof decking and gable ends. Electricity and water will be unavailable for several days to weeks after the storm passes.

Category 4: Catastrophic damage will occur. Well-built frame homes can sustain severe damage with loss of most of the roof structure and/or some exteri-

or walls. Most trees and power poles will isolate residential areas. Power outages will last weeks to possibly months. Most of the area will be uninhabitable for weeks or months.

Category 5: Catastrophic damages will occur. A high percentage of framed homes will be destroyed with total roof failure and wall collapse. Fallen trees and power poles will isolate residential areas. Power outages will last for weeks, possibly months. Most of the area will be uninhabitable for weeks or months.

Hurricane Special Needs

The Special Needs Program is available to all Lee County residents at no cost. It provides shelter for those who live in a home and or area that is not safe from storm surge or wind and who have no other safe place to go. It also provides transportation to a shelter if they have no way to get there. You must register for the Special Needs services.

The Special Needs Program does not guarantee you will be assigned a space in the Special Needs Medical Shelter. Your application will be reviewed by the Department of Health and you may be

assigned a shelter.

Some things you should know about the Special Needs program:

You must update your information every year.

 Lee County will stop processing applications when the county enters the five-day forecast cone of a storm, so submit your application early in the season.

 Not every shelter will open. Only those safe from storm surge and wind for each particular

storm will open.

• Emergency Public Shelters are open to every-

one and do not require pre-registration.

- Bring to the shelter things you need to survive, such as prescriptions, personal hygiene items, sleeping bag, cot, pillow, change of clothes, glasses, special dietary needs, books/ magazines/cards or other things to help pass the time while sheltering.
- Food and water will be provided, but we suggest you bring some food and drinks with you.
- Service animals are allowed in all shelters.

You can bring your dog or cat to shelter with you at the General Population and Special Medical Needs Shelters. They will be housed and sleep in a different area from you, but you will have access to them for feeding, walking and spending time.

What you need to know about the Special Medical Needs Shelter:

- The Special Medical Needs Shelter will be open for those with medical needs that require electricity, such as oxygen dependence, dialysis, ventilators, nebulizers, etc.
- You must pre-register for the Special Medical Needs Shelter using the application above.
- You need a companion/caregiver to accompany you during the time you shelter, as we have a limited number of staff working.
- After a shelter has been assigned to you by Dept. of Health, you will receive a confirmation letter and instructions to advise what to expect if shelters are opening.

You will receive a call to let you know when we are opening the Special Medical Needs Shelter.

Protecting your pets in a hurricane



In a hurricane, pets are subjected to the same hazards as people and have many of the same needs. Evacuating to a friend's home or petfriendly hotel outside of the evacuation zone would be a good plan. If that isn't available, you can bring your cat or dog to our Petfriendly Shelter.

Pet-Friendly shelters will be open in every storm; locations may vary.

Lee County Domestic Animal Services (LCDAS) manages this shelter. It is first-come, first-served, and there is no pre-registration required. You must shelter at the school with your pet (in other words, you cannot drop your pet at the shelter and leave). Owners are responsible for feeding, exercising and cleaning up after their pets.

Your pet will need a Hurricane Disaster Kit, too. It should include water, non-perishable food, medications and clean-up supplies. You will need a crate or carrier, collar and leash, and up-to-date vaccination records for your pet. Having a recent photo of your pet will be helpful if you get separated.

Remember:

- Never leave your pets outside during a storm.
- Never leave a cat with a dog, even if the two are normally friends.
- Confine and keep small pets (birds, hamsters, etc.) away from cats and dogs.
- Dangerous animals should be secured in special crates or cages.
